* The age limit is 4 ½ and up. Kids younger than this must be accompanied

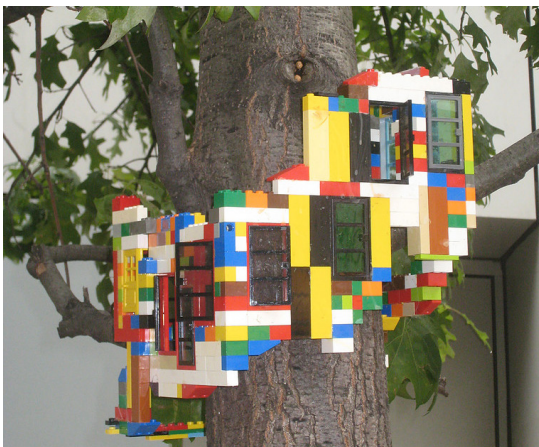
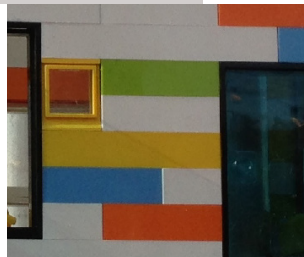

'Building a Shelter Together'

Working with Lego bricks to create eye-catching public art, New York-based Korean artist Jaye Moon runs interactive and participatory project, 'Building a Shelter Together'. Visitors can become a part of the process via adding Lego blocks to the existing work, and are cordially invited to bring their building blocks for the structures to gradually and organically grow. Moon uses blocks to reclaim a space, gather people and conjure up a sense of childlike exploration and play. Moon will also combine everyday objects such as plumbing pipes, water, buckets, food, plants, curtains, clothes, hangers and other materials as further reminders of shelters.

After the project is over, the blocks will be donated to local charity organisations so that they can build shelters too.



'Portable Housing'

Jaye Moon also creates this playful site-specific installation showing throughout the Business Design Centre. Moon entangles toy blocks within the existing architectural structure of the London Art Fair venue to create a space which encapsulates the essence of nomadic housing and environment. Lego blocks are world renowned as an identifiable object from our childhoods. In this work, these blocks are standardised in a ready-made shape, ready to be linked together through mathematical patterns. The artist's aim in this work is to break down the linguistic, cultural and social confines by connecting people through the block - both figuratively and actively - encouraging visitors to become more aware of their surroundings.
